Context

- Research is being done looking at fathers' role in positive child outcomes
- There is a need to develop a more coordinated approach to this research
- It can lend important insights into program, their development, effectiveness, and ultimate success

Strategies for Engaging Fathers Providing benefits to fathers

- What is in it for him?
- Give emotional and relationship management skills
- Incentives for fathers
- O Employment
- Transportation
- Building his skills
- O Asking what HE needs

Strategies for Engaging Fathers Communication Strategies

- Labeling these issues to attract fathers
- Educating the community about the value of men in the lives of children
- Special outreach that reinforces mothers' support for the unique and complementary role of fathers
- Educating men about their role in positive child and family outcomes

Strategies for Engaging Fathers Inter- and intrapersonal processes

- Giving him responsibility for his self care
- Balancing the request of men
- Involved practices that involve the men
- Begin from the perspective that fathers are assets
- Respect his personal "down-time" space
- Building rapport with the men where they reside

Strategies for Engaging Fathers Inter- and intrapersonal processes

- Acknowledging the diversity of men
- Building a bridge between the men and.....
- Advancing the cultural ways of being for these men
- Considering the changing role of men and fathers
- Being with them in their space

Strategies for Engaging Fathers Health-related interventions

- Building off of already established healthcare interventions focused on men
 - O Leveraging changes in health laws to support the work
- Use of intermediaries to support health care and family health
- ✓ Ultrasounds
- Putting Mom's health/ pregnancy status on men's health screen

Strategies for Engaging Fathers Health-related interventions

- Putting Dad's health status on mom's health screen
- Training for health care advisors
- Capitalizing on the prenatal opportunity with fathers

Strategies for Engaging Fathers Policy and practice strategies

- What are the policy issues that impact men and their involvement with family?
- Attention to the physical environment that serves families
- Barbershop interventions
- Where are we engaging men and for what
- O Concrete strategies to support mothers during childbirth
- O How do you articulate the issues within and outside of the systems supporting this work?

- Letting go of Western paradigms and meanings
- O Understanding the associated values
- Make an investment in community that extend beyond the research
- Build communities within the context of the men themselves
- Community as an incentive

- Understanding that the time of the community is valuable too
- Expanding our conceptualization of community (i.e., internet community)
- Institutionalizing the knowledge learned at community level
- Demonstrate that father outcomes impact child and family outcomes

- Are there considerations for unique subpopulations (e.g., military men)
- O What are the practical guidelines for scaling up
- Issues of sustainability

- Understanding clearly the "lane we are driving in" so as to not undermine the work
- Larger social values impacting the work
- Building a good evidence base
- Understanding where we are in the development of the field
- Policy issues at the community level

Creating new collaborations Practical recommendations

- Clear conceptualization of what you want to do and how you want to get there
- Using CBPR informed approaches
- Seeking researcher-practitioner collaborations
- Building off of the experience of those ahead of us
 - O Healthy Start
 - 0 MA
 - Hospitals

Creating new collaborations Practical recommendations

- O More focus on engaging the voices of fathers directly
- Being explicit about how community partners use it in their work
- Products that come from the work are done in collaboration with community partners to ensure that they are useful to them too
- Engaging non-traditional partners (e.g. businesses)
- Public health impact of the work

Creating new collaborations Practical recommendations

- What are the incentives for community organizations and businesses
- Looking at international examples
- Hybrid organizations developed to serve men in unique circumstances (e.g., formerly incarcerated)
- Understanding and engaging men in the places where men are

Creating new collaborations Research related considerations

- Special emphasis study section for fatherhood applications
- Using mixed methods approaches in the work
- Building on the experience of established programs
- Considering unique context for the work
 - ⊘ Schools
 - O Child welfare system
- Unique funding opportunities to support this work
